News from Cairo Street

I once remarked when conducting a service at Ullet Road that when we join a congregation our motive is because we have found a home where we can worship but how quickly we become cleaner, caretaker, financial officer, news editor, tea maker, gardener and general dogs body. The problem a lot of us have is I am told 'is that we cannot say no.' But when things are happening as a result of our involvement don't we feel good.

There is always a drama or an event waiting to happen at Cairo Street.

We recently held a 'boon day' and members came along and cleared our old garden area of weeds and self grown seedlings and now mown and managed we intend to use the area for what it was intended as an area for the holding of events and for our younger members to play in.

As costs increase the struggle to maintain our churches and chapel as places of worship becomes even more difficult. We at Cairo Street have had a difficult few years. One of our main sources of income, the letting of our shop premises, has over the past few years been of great concern. The difficulties began with the tenant not paying the rent and his cheques bouncing and then he was convicted of burglary and sentenced to a Prison sentence. During this time the Inland Revenue took an interest in his business activities and his assets were seized. To ensure that the property could be re-let we applied and received a loan from the MDMA to undertake repairs to the property. However, the shop remained unlet and with no income from the shop, money was draining from our account.

Now the former Jewellers Shop is a hair dressing salon and nail centre and I went along to the Official Opening and was impressed with the structural changes that the new tenants have undertaken (at their own expense) and inwardly thinking of the income that the chapel will soon be recouping in rent which will assist our chapel to remain solvent and plan for the future with renewed vigour.

Our Heritage Day event proved a great success with an increased number of visitors. We had some visitors who had travelled a considerable distance to visit the chapel. One visitor Pam Morris who contributes to our flower fund travelled from Fleetwood to visit us and reminisced of her childhood memories of the chapel. Our connections with Joseph Priestley, William and Elizabeth Gaskell and Warrington Academy interested many of our visitors as did the information we have on display outlining our Unitarian Beliefs and Values.

On Sunday 21st September we held our Annual Academy Service. This year Janice Hayes of Warrington Museum Services spoke on the political life of Frederick Monks. With a number of his descendants present it was interesting to listen how his Unitarian faith shaped his life and the good he did for his fellow man. One quote that Janice used from his writings included this, 'the Irish workmen employed on a day by day basis should be treated as equal to everyone else' So when you next visit Warrington go along to the Town Hall and inspect the Town Hall Gates presented by Frederick Monks. Now called the Golden Gates they are a testament to a great Warrington Unitarian.

Heritage events on the 13th of September 2014

Many of our churches open their doors for the Heritage weekend which this year was 13th September. Young Mr Gabriel was happy to report that Ancient Chapel welcomed over 200 visitors. They took all the leaflets that were available and contributed to a very happy weekend.

Hucklow Summer School

Two intrepid Unitarians from Wirral attended the annual Unitarian Summer School in the Derbyshire village of Great Hucklow in the third week of August.

It was a new experience for both of us as we were led into a week of **Discovery** to find 'the **Authentic Self'** – indeed the theme for the summer school.

It was hectic, stimulating, exhausting, sometimes tearful and just a whirlwind of activities to blow your inner psyche or perhaps do a bit of painting, walking or singing. Something for everyone, young and old including 'a silent auction', book stall fund, meditation and evening lantern walks to Hucklow Chapel.

The week was introduced by the Rev Michael Dadson, the pastoral leader and a long-term member of the current Summer School planning committee. The planning committee tried to reflect the range of Unitarian theological positions in the theme talks and *engagement groups*.



Michael talked us through the purpose of the week; the fellowship and *Covenant* that we would build over our short period together – our covenant to feel responsibility towards the Community. Part of this fellowship was singing songs (often in rounds), making friendships in groups and at meal times, sharing ideas, acknowledging and enabling the young people to be part of the Community.

There were optional workshops such as poetry, writing and walking but the thrust of the week was based on the *Engagement Groups* and *Theme Talks* (a sort of mini lecture based around the authentic Self). You were expected to attend these throughout the week.

Everyday you would attend the same engagement group and build on the progress of each session working towards a resolution or room for more discovery. I attended the 'Conference of Birds' group. This was based on the poem written by the medieval Islamic poet, Attar. I really enjoyed this group as we explored the journey of the birds to find their quest of a higher power. This poem provided a lovely metaphor for our own personal journeys through beginnings, youth, discovery, ups and downs, loss and towards the end finding our destiny. The poem was influenced by Sufism. I liked it because it included a variety of creative and non -threatening settings to look at life. Just a taste of it – we made our own birds and danced to music to express the different paths on our (or the bird's) journey. (Christine)

Irene took part in the 'Identifying and living as your authentic self' engagement group. I know that all the participants worked really hard in this group and there was plenty of soul searching going on. Everyone seemed to survive and live for another day. But I do know they wanted to get to the 'heart of the matter' in our own spiritual and personal lives.

The theme talks took place every morning before the engagement groups; Jane Blackall, Maria Curtis ..., Michael Dadson, Celia Cartwright and Ralph Catts were all contributors. The talks outlined a range of approaches to the Authentic Self and in the late afternoon we had the opportunity to discuss the talk with the morning's speaker.



For me, there was more emphasis on community than I had expected but this has given me a better insight into the breadth of current thinking **within** Unitarian circles. I learnt a lot. Plenty to think about and consider for another year......


