A Celebration and Thank you to Marie

Marie's Celebratory Service was held on 21st November 2014 at her home chapel in Nottage. It was packed full to the brim with friends and family packed into the gallery, downstairs and even up the steps to the pulpit. The Rev John Harley hoped that there weren't any Health and Safety people there to see! There were Unitarians from the South East Wales chapels but also many Unitarians from all over the country attended who knew Marie and had developed special friendships with her and the family such as from the Unitarian Music Society, Youth Programme or from Meditation courses. Marie had friends there from all stages of her life, from school onwards in Lincolnshire as well as from her local community in the Newton and Porthcawl areas and family members. Members of the local community appreciated many things about knowing her, including her and Alastair's contribution to the girls' primary and secondary schools.

A very beautiful enlarged photograph of Marie was placed at the front of the church along with a flower arrangement which Alastair had organised to be made up as a replica of Marie's wedding bouquet.

The service was led by the Rev John Harley who knows the family well as Isabelle and Elizabeth have taken a full part in the Unitarian National Youth Programme, mostly centred at the Nightingale Centre, Great Hucklow in Derbyshire. John provided a caring and eloquent celebration of Marie as a facilitator and 'midwife' of life. After her career as an army and then an NHS midwife Marie took on training as a Complementary Holistic Therapist with her own home-based practice. Isabelle, Marie's eldest daughter spoke movingly about her mother as did Alastair. We even heard the story of Marie meeting Alastair for the first time and advising him to get his teeth fixed as one day a woman would want to marry him!! Isabelle confided that her outfit had been approved for the occasion! Members of the congregation were also invited to share any thoughts and Julie Nedin spoke briefly on behalf of SEWUS to voice our appreciation of Marie's contribution to Unitarians in South East Wales.

The service was followed by a reception on the Porthcawl Sea front in the conservatory of the Atlantic Hotel overlooking the sea and guests toasted Marie with champagne. The family had asked for this to be a celebration of Marie's life and for those attending to wear bright clothes and this made a very fitting end to a fantastic celebration of Marie's life.

As a personal tribute to Marie I would like to give my gratitude to her for encouraging parents such as Helen, Rhiannon and myself to send our children to Juniors, Seniors and Inters events at Great Hucklow as part of the Youth Programme. I would probably never have got Carrie organised to go without encouragement from Marie and I know how much my daughter and other young people in the

district have enjoyed attending the National Youth Programme events. Marie brought Unitarian parents and children like myself and my daughter in South East Wales district together for a painting pottery session in October 2006 at the Art Cafe in Porthcawl. This then developed into Marie setting up a day at Nottage Chapel in December 2006 with John Harley, the G.A.Youth Coordinator on behalf of the South East Wales District for a 'Lighting our Chalice – Inviting Fresh Sparks' day. This cemented friendships between children and adults alike and was much appreciated as it was difficult because of numbers for each chapel to put on their own events to meet other Unitarian parents and children. In 2007 we then held a series of Intergenerational services with Julianne Morgan in Swansea followed by services at Wick chapel and at Penrhiw chapel, St Fagans. Marie played an active part with this and had many imaginative ideas for worship. Rev John Harley then returned in 2007 to lead a Children's Workshop and Intergenerational service at Hen Dŷ Cwrdd, Cefncoed. Joy Foster and myself went on in 2011 to undertake youth leader training on the Revolution course and there are currently Childrens' Sunday Clubs running in Aberdare and Cardiff. A number of Unitarian Services and events over recent years have been held in our district chapels and churches which have actively included our children and young people. We need to carry this on into the future and keep our children and young people involved nationally as well.

GA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE KEY MESSAGES 14 & 15 NOVEMBER 2014

1. General Assembly President 2015/2016

We are pleased to announce that Rev John Clifford will be nominated at the forthcoming Annual Meetings for the position of President of the General Assembly for 2015/2016. Born and trained in the United States John moved to the UK in 1970 and ministered with churches in England, Scotland and Wales as well as spending 13 years working at Essex Hall. He has also extensive experience of international engagement through the ICUU and the IARF.

2. General Assembly Vice President 2015/2016 leading to Presidency in 2016/17

Unfortunately the Executive Committee was not able to make a nomination as no proposals had been received. The deadline for receipt of proposals has therefore been extended until 16 January 2015.

3. Youth Strategy Group

Jen Hazel was invited to present the initial thinking of the group which has been established to consider how work with children, young people and young adults could be developed across the Unitarian Movement. The group has concluded that there is a large gap in our congregations and organisations to support people aged 16-25 years. They have suggested a three-year development project to enrich and develop the experience for young people within Unitarianism.

The Executive Committee has welcomed the approach being taken and asked for further work on a development plan for wider consultation with young people, congregations and others who have an interest for their next meeting in January 2015. The Youth Strategy Group members were thanked for their contributions to date.

4. Red Cross Emergency Appeal

5. Vision Day Follow-up

The Executive Committee thanked everyone who had attended the Vision Day, held on 6 September 2014 at Cross Street Chapel, Manchester. Feedback has been very positive and there was considerable engagement by all those present from across the country.

Work is now underway to produce comment pieces for publication in The Unitarian and The Inquirer on the key issues raised and to gain further input. It is envisaged that these will be published in a booklet at the Annual Meetings. A video is also to be produced in co-operation with UKunitarianTV also to be launched at the Annual Meetings as part of the EC report. It is planned that these will form the basis of a new 5-year plan for the work of the General Assembly in support of congregations.

6. Good Society

Support has been given to a project of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland which will lead to a publication in January 2015 of a shared statement of our vision for the Good Society as a positive contribution to the public debate in the run up to the 2015 UK General Election.

7. Millennium Fund

Portsmouth Unitarians (John Pounds Memorial Unitarian Church) were awarded £3000 for equipment as part of a major capital upgrade of kitchen facilities to support a plan being implemented for more meaningful engagement with the local community through their "Open Church" and "Outreach" projects.

8. Study Motions

The Executive Committee discussed recent comments in The Inquirer about the use of study motions on social justice issues as a way of improving our processes of deliberation at the Annual Meetings. It was agreed that a workshop for those interested in this issue would be sponsored at the forthcoming General Assembly Meetings in Birmingham in 2015.
