#### INDUCTION OF REVEREND LEWIS REES

The Induction Service of Rev Lewis Rees took place at 2.30pm on Saturday, 16<sup>th</sup> January at Nottage General Baptist and Unitarian Chapel. The well-attended service was conducted by Rev Eric Jones, minister emeritus at Highland Place, Aberdare, with Isabelle Rosenberg of the Nottage congregation providing organ accompaniment for the hymns, and other incidental music.

Rev Eric Jones welcomed all present, especially those who had travelled from afar to be there and apologies were received from those unable to attend.

Rev Jeffrey Gould, minister at Hale, Cheshire, representing the Unitarian Christian Association, presented a Reading and Rev Wyn Thomas, on behalf of the South Wales Unitarian Association, delivered the Charge to the Congregation. Next came a period of prayer and meditation, led by Rev Ant Howe, minister at Birmingham Hollywood, which was followed by a musical interlude.

Then followed the Ceremony of Induction performed by the Officers of Nottage Chapel (Mrs Jean Thomas, Mrs Avril Protheroe and Mr Alastair Rosenberg) and commitments were made by both minister and officers to work together in the interests of the chapel.

The service closed with the benediction being delivered by Rev Lewis Rees.

With the formalities of the afternoon over, all present withdrew to the Schoolroom where the ladies and friends of the congregation excelled themselves in the sumptuous buffet tea they provided.

The occasion marked the beginning of a new chapter in the history of Nottage Chapel and we wish the congregation and the Rev Lewis Rees every success in their newly formed partnership.

#### **DISTRICT CHRISTMAS SERVICE**

The SEWUS Christmas Service was held at Hen Dŷ Cwrdd, Trecynon, Aberdare at 11am on 6<sup>th</sup> December. The chapel is now owned by Addoldai Cymru (Welsh Religious Buildings Trust) and has undergone restoration, with further work planned by Friends of Hen Dŷ Cwrdd.

At present there is no electricity supply so power for the organ was brought in from an adjoining cottage thanks to the kind cooperation of Mrs Marian Davies. We had been advised to wear extra layers of clothing as there would be no heating but conditions were surprisingly comfortable—helped, no doubt, by the proliferation of candles.

District President, Tony Foster, welcomed everyone and guided us through the now well-tried format of Readings and Carols presented by representatives from each District congregation, which had been organised by District Secretary, Lis Dyson-Jones. Highland Place organist Jacob Jones provided accompaniment for the carols, and his young sister, Grace, played additional Christmas music on the flute.

As there were no facilities available, lunch was served at Highland Place schoolroom after the service.

## **GA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE KEY MESSAGES 13 NOVEMBER 2015**

#### 1. President of the General Assembly 2016-17

The Executive Committee is pleased to announce that Dorothy (Dot) Hewerdine will be nominated for the position of President of the General Assembly 2016/17 at the Annual Meetings in April 2016. Dot was nominated by the Scottish Unitarian Association, Sheffield and District Association of Unitarian and Free Christian Churches and Cardiff Unitarians/Undodiaid Caerdydd.

Dot was born into a Unitarian family attending the Hunslet Unitarian Church, Leeds and was involved with the Unitarian Young People's League in Yorkshire. She went on to serve in many national roles across the Unitarian Movement, with a particular interest in the development and training of Lay Leaders and Ministers. She is chair of the Hibbert Trust and serves on the committee of Unitarian College Manchester. She is a former member of the Executive Committee.

Unfortunately the Executive Committee was unable to make any nomination for the position of Vice-President 2016/17 as no names were received for consideration.

## 2. Annual Meetings 2017

For the third year running, the venue for the Annual Meetings in 2017, which will take place from 10 - 13 April, will again be the Hilton Metropole, Birmingham. This was a popular and successful venue in 2015, and we return there next year. There has been excellent feedback from attendees, particularly on the ease of transport connections from all parts of the country and we are pleased to have come to satisfactory arrangements with the Hotel.

#### 3. Nightingale Centre

The Annual Budget for the Nightingale Centre was approved by the Executive Committee in their role as Trustees of the Centre. An overall break-even position is forecast and a generally conservative approach to finances has been adopted throughout.

Discussion took place on the "Management Delegation Principles" governing the relationship between the Executive Committee and the Centre's Management Committee. Consultation will take place with the Management Committee on revised draft proposals and we hope to have an agreed version signed-off at the January 2016 EC meeting.

## 4. Ministry Strategy Group

It was agreed that Jane Couper should be appointed as a member of the Ministry Strategy Group.

It was agreed that Bob Janis Dillon, a Unitarian-Universalist Minister currently working as a Partnership Minister in Merseyside, should be accepted to work towards inclusion on the General Assembly Roll of Ministers, with a programme of suitable training and mentorship to accompany his work with congregations.

#### **MEN'S GROUP**

On 10<sup>th</sup> November we gathered at the Glamorgan Archives on Sloper Road, Cardiff. After having our identities checked and photographs taken at reception, we were given ID cards and allowed in. After viewing the document archives on computer, we all requested documents relating to churches and chapels in the South East Wales District.

I filled in a request slip to see copies of the church and chapel calendars, a forerunner of the District News, and what a lot of them there were. I decided to look at a bound copy for the year 1928. What a fascinating read. I jotted down just a few notes from the months of February and March.

Highland Place – the hot topics of the month were the induction of the Rev Constance Harris, and the installation of a new heating apparatus, being able to worship the Lord not only in the beauty of holiness, but also in comfort and warmth, the latter condition being generally necessary to the former.

Cardiff West Grove – the church League of Youth held their 5<sup>th</sup> Christmas Breakfast for 120 poor children of the city. After carol singing each child received a parcel of fruit and toys.

Hen Dŷ Cwrdd, Cefn Coed – on its 180<sup>th</sup> anniversary, £180 was raised for redecorating the interior and exterior of the church. (Hen Dŷ Cwrdd was referred to as a church rather than chapel in a number of articles)

Nottage – the closing of the Winter's Work was marked as usual by two social gatherings over two evenings. The first evening was for congregation and Sunday School for over 14s with over seventy attending. The second evening for the under 14s with 50 attending.

Swansea – held a petition against the establishment of a greyhound racing track. The petition was so successful that over 60 churches joined Swansea Unitarians in the fight. A lantern lecture was given on Ireland with the prospect of a conducted party to Ireland in the Summer. The Unitarian church was the first to have a wayside pulpit in Swansea.

We had lunch at the Sand Martin Carvery and returned to the Archives in the afternoon for a guided tour. Our thanks to Alun Watts for arranging a very enjoyable and interesting day and I will certainly return to view more of the documents on South East Wales Unitarians.

On 8<sup>th</sup> December we joined together for our Christmas meal at the Ynyscynon Inn, Cwmbach, Aberdare. An excellent way to end the year, with good food and good company.
