beyond the traffic lights, on the right opposite the Roman Catholic Church

Usually there are hymns and prayers in which you can participate or not, as you wish

Readings may well include thoughts from faiths other than Christianity or from secular thinkers

There is no assumption that you will necessarily agree with all the content of the readings, or with the preacher's address, but hopefully the range of sources used will help make the service an enriching spiritual experience for those who attend, whatever their individual beliefs or non-beliefs

Occasionally we hold services that are particularly suitable for families with young children

Our personal approach to special life events.
