Our thoughts must be with the flood victims, who have suffered so much from the stormy weather, which was unleashed upon us. We wish them well.

At our planning meeting on 15th January, members decided to no longer meet fortnightly but to meet, formally, once a month, with e.g. a speaker and otherwise, informally.

On 29th January, members relaxed with a musical session featuring their CD choices.

On 5th February, Margaret Abrahams, from Women's Aid, gave us a very informative talk about the harrowing and alarming aspects of violence meted out to domestic violence victims. These are women and children, who arrive at the Women's Aid Refuge, distressed, traumatised and sometimes, with no possessions other than what they are wearing. Also, she spoke of how victims can develop physical, emotional and psychological problems. Worryingly, some children may carry out future domestic abuse because of their upbringing.

A shocking statistic is 2 women are killed every single week from domestic violence.

Our speaker informed us that, upon their arrival, victims are given a bag of personal items, e.g. deodorants for adults and children are given a bag of toys, e.g. crayons.

At this juncture, I, on behalf of our Branch, would like to thank all contributors to our appeal to aid Women's Aid by donating personal items for adults and new toys for the children. It was an amazing response and much appreciated!

On 12th February, members enjoyed hearing of our favourite books and poems and the next week, participated in board games and social chat.

On 26th February, we had lunch at 'The Bute' in Aberdare to support a local business.

On 4th March, I gave a topical talk on 'Royal Newcomers,' which was well received and the next week, members delighted in a 'Craft & Chat' session.

Now, we look forward to our District AGM to be held at Cefn Coed's Women's League Branch on March 18.


