GA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE KEY MESSAGES 15 JULY 2019

- 1. As part of the process to review and refresh the General Assembly's strategic plan, the Executive Committee and Chief Officer shared their personal motivations and visions for the denomination. Factors in our external context (e.g. changes in social trends; partners we might work with) were also reviewed, along with the movement's strengths and weaknesses, and the impact we currently have. This will inform the planning process ahead of the next EC meeting at the Nightingale Centre in September.
- 2. We would like to invite you to contribute your vision to this stage of the planning process. Details from Audrey Longhurst (alonghurst @unitarian.org.uk).
- 3. Applications are welcome for new members of the Stipend Review Committee. This group makes a recommendation on the proposed minimum stipend paid by congregations to ministers and lay pastors, along with guidance on manse allowance, expenses and parental leave. We seek diversity on this committee, and all applications are welcome, and should be made by email to the Chief Officer.
- 4. The Executive Committee congratulates the Nightingale Centre Manager and Management Committee for their concerted efforts in improving the Centre's ecological footprint. The Centre is regularly assessed for its green credentials and proudly displays its Peak Park Environmental Quality Award. Full details of the Centre's environmental and sustainability achievements can be viewed on its website. Currently being explored is the feasibility of installing solar panels and an electric car charger.
- 5. The Chief Officer gave an update and shared her reflections on her first four months.
- 6. There was discussion on the need to improve the way that the GA makes itself known online, in order for our message to reach more people.
- 7. The Ethical Investment Policy was discussed, and the need for further work on it was identified, before an ethical policy can be implemented.

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of Celia Evans, wife of Humphrey, on 23rd July (Rev Eric Jones writes further in this issue). The funeral which took place on Monday 5th August was held at Highland Place Church and Llwydcoed Crematorium with Rev Eric Jones officiating. Friends from across the district attended. Our sympathy and thoughts go to Humphrey and family.

Also causes of sadness over the past few weeks were the deaths of the following people connected with Highland Place:

Jimmy Rees of Cwmdare, brother of Carol and Hazel Jones; John Battenbo of Clydach – John and his wife Mattie were active members at Highland Place when they lived in Llwydcoed; and David Cowdry of Hirwaun, formerly of Tŷ Fry and Llwydcoed, who died on 29th July at Prince Charles Hospital after an operation – David was 71 years of age. He was very fond of Highland Place and never forgot the years he spent at Sunday School and in the Youth Group. He contributed financially to the church funds over the years and the family have presented the church with a Vase in memory of him. The funeral Service was conducted by the Rev Eric Jones at Llwydcoed on 13th August.

CELIA EVANS

I first got to know Celia just over 50 years ago. Humphrey & Celia were to be married at Highland Place. I don't remember much about the wedding, but it had snowed heavily in the night and Humphrey's cousin, John Morse and others came along early in the morning with shovels to clear a path from the road to the church.

Celia immediately joined in the activities at Highland Place, and became a Sunday School Teacher. She would help with parties and join us as a leader when we took children away for a week's holiday in Cwmwrdu. She became a President of the Women's League, supported along the years and worked hard for Sales of Work and joined in the fun at Socials and entertainment evenings.

Because she was confined to a wheelchair for so many years, there is a danger that we may forget the 'earlier' Celia, full of energy, brightness and enthusiasm.

We will all miss her for many reasons. Celia never complained, she never took umbrage, she never pouted. I don't remember any kind of unpleasantness or difficulties or awkwardness. She was 45 years of age when she was diagnosed with M.S. but she was able to carry on normally for at least ten years afterwards but there was a slow deterioration and for the last 10 years, she was blind and confined to a wheelchair.

Even then, she remained positive and greeted everyone with a smile. She was never bitter and never complained. Up to a couple of weeks back, she would attend the church on three occasions every week without fail – on a Sunday, for Meditation Group on a Monday and the Women's League on a Wednesday. What is more, she looked forward to attending, enjoyed every minute, felt better for having been, and everyone else enjoyed her company.

Celia was a ray of sunshine both in her healthy years and in her years of illness. She was a star and the place will be darker without her.

She gave everything, appreciated everything and kept a positive attitude.

Our sympathy is extended to Humphrey, to daughter Alison and son Jonathan in their loss as well as four granddaughters Jessica, Megan, Emily and Lucy.

CARDIFF UNITARIANS / UNDODIAID CAERDYDD

In June I took part in a charity walk for Wales' Children's Hospital around the churches and chapels in Cardiff City Centre, Grangetown, and Butetown. At each church there was a hymn and a prayer and it was interesting to see inside the many and varied communities in central Cardiff.

June also saw the one hundredth anniversary of the racist riots that happened in Cardiff, Barry, and other port cities in 1919. Ethnic minorities in these cities feared for their lives as white mobs roamed the streets, particular targeting mixed race families. In June there were a series of events in Cardiff to commemorate this, including at the Cardiff Story Museum, and I was very interested to learn about these events. Cardiff has a long history of being a multicultural city but it's good to remember it wasn't always easy and there is a legacy of racism that still needs to be faced up to.

July saw the Extinction Rebellion Summer Uprising with a big green boat blocking Castle Street for three days to make as loud a demand as possible to the government to act on the climate emergency. As part of my involvement in Extinction Rebellion I helped to organise an interfaith event beforehand with speakers from Anglican, Buddhist, Tibetan Buddhist, Quaker, Hindu, Pagan, Muslim, and Unitarian speakers. It was a beautiful ceremony and helped everyone there to think about what motivates them to change the world.

We were delighted to host the district for the summer service this year. After a lovely pub lunch we gathered in the Meeting House to worship together.

MEN'S GROUP

The group ventured north of Cefn Coed to visit St Gwynno's Church at Vaynor. We were met by the organist Mrs. Anne Jones who opened the church for us. Philip Griffiths provided each of us with a printed history of the church and we saw the grave of the ironmaster Crawshay, owner of Cyfarthfa iron works. The tombstone, measuring 11ft by 7ft, weighs nine tons and bears the inscription 'God Forgive Me'.

Philip then guided us down a track to the site of the original Norman church and the surviving tower, now much overgrown. A very unusual tower, that was well worth seeing.

We then stopped off on our way for lunch at the nearby Aberglais Inn at the 'Berdydd' locally held to be a burial mound associated with the Battle of Maes-y-Vaynor in 1291, or the site of a Motte and Bailey castle located in Cae Byrraf Dydd 'the field of the shortest day' possibly then the 5th January under the old calendar. Our thanks to Philip for arranging the visit.

On the 15th August we met at Aberdare museum to see an exhibition on the South Wales Jewish community. The exhibition was very detailed with newspaper articles, quotes and many photographs of synagogues around South Wales, the Jewish cemetery at Cefncoed, the setting up of Treforest industrial estate, Jewish sports teams and much more. A very interesting exhibition giving information on all aspects of Jewish life in South Wales. This was followed by a tour of the museum and lunch in the café.

We meet next on 19th September for a visit to Morlais Castle, the Norman fort associated with Vaynor Church followed by lunch at Morlais Castle Golf Club.
